This talk will cover the various delivery technologies that are in common use to provide digital video: Over the air DTV; telephone based copper technologies of DSL, VDSL, and DSL2+; Fiber to the home PON concepts; and the CATV/HFC coaxial delivery model. The above technologies will be described in a briefing overview format. The central take away will be an appreciation of how varied technology carriers distribute digital video content.

While there, he designed, built, and managed 400 cable television systems serving communities in seven states. Internationally Robert has worked in New Zealand, Mexico and the U.K.

Robert is a lifetime member of the Society of Cable Telecommunications Engineers (SCTE). He was a member of the technical advisory board at Cable Labs. He is a member of the Northeast Wisconsin section of IEEE, and has worked closely with many manufacturers. Former Wisconsin Governor, Tommy Thompson, appointed Robert, with confirmation by the State Senate, to sit on the board of directors for the Wisconsin Advanced Telecommunications Foundation (WATF) from 1995 to 2001.

The 2% annual worldwide growth in energy usage projected by the EIA will be unachievable in the very near future from any mix of new and current energy sources. This will put increasing pressure on developing high-efficiency engines for transportation and other applications.

The development is privately funded and is being done in a state-of-the-art facility with an engineering and scientific staff of 47. A Technical Advisory Board of engine experts meets regularly; it is comprised of three members of the NAE and four Fellows of the SAE. Extensive use is made of FEA, CFD, KIVA-3, and a cluster computer. The company has developed its own proprietary fuel injection systems aided by laser doppler anemometry instrumentation. All parts except crankshafts are made in house with 3 axis, 4 axis, and 5 axis numerical mills and NC lathes.

The principles behind the basic engine and status of the development will be described.

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Dr. Lemke has a Ph.D. in Theoretical Physics from UCSB, an M.S. in Physics from Northwestern University where he was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, and a B.S. in Physics from IIT. He is currently an Adjunct Professor in ECE at University of California San Diego.

His professional career has been primarily in the field of applied science and engineering with an emphasis on information theory, magnetic materials, information storage devices, and internal combustion engines.

He founded Spin Physics, Inc. (SPI) in 1968 and ran it as CEO and CTO for approximately 15 years. The company employed a workforce of 650 and made magnetic recording transducers employing unique magnetic materials developed and patented by the company. At one time 50% of the broadcast hours on television worldwide were recorded on SPI magnetic heads, and 90% of the recorders at the National Security Agency used SPI heads. Dr. Lemke sold the company to Eastman Kodak and became a Fellow of the Eastman Kodak Research Laboratories. Subsequently, he has founded and sold several other companies that developed high-density information storage devices employing unconventional materials. He has licensed his patents to IBM, RCA, Seagate, 3M, and many others.

His current interests are in the field of efficient internal combustion engines. He founded Achates Power, Inc. to develop a uniquely lightweight, environmentally clean compression-ignition engine based on 10 years of his research in this field. Achates Power has a scientific/ engineering staff of 75 in a state-of-the-art laboratory in San Diego.

He is a 7,000 hour pilot with multi-engine and instrument ratings.

#### IEEE and Eta Kappa Nu Honor Society Sign Merger Agreement

24 February — IEEE signed a merger agreement with the honor society ETA Kappa Nu (HKN), a nonprofit, public-service organization comprising nearly 200 university chapters, 14 February 2009. The merger, which will go into effect by mid-2009 pending final approval, will make HKN the official honor society of IEEE, recognizing scholarship and academic excellence and identifying student leaders, young professionals and eminent scholars in the IEEE's technical fields of interest.

Under the agreement, HKN will become an organizational unit of IEEE, governed by the new IEEE-HKN Board of Governors. A restricted endowment will be created in the IEEE Foundation to support HKN's educational, societal, and recognition activities. In addition to holding HKN's current assets, the new endowment will receive an initial donation of US\$1.2M from IEEE.

### Transitioning from College to Work

Congratulations! You just graduated from college and landed your first full-time job. Now what?

Each year, an average of 1.5 million young adults will leave the relative comfort of college and enter the uncertainty of a new job. If you are one of these recent graduates, the following tips can help ease your transition.

- 1. Prepare Physically You should prepare both mentally and physically for work. Adjust your lifestyle, if needed, to match normal work hours. Cut out the all-nighters and late-night social events to prepare your body for the routine of working from 9-5.
- 2. Manage your expectations Just because you were a whiz in college will not automatically make you one at work. You might have to ease your way into the group by earning your place. Prepare yourself mentally to not know everything on your first or even fortieth day on the job. Focus on your strengths (jot them down to remind yourself) and think about how you can use those strengths to solve the problems in your new position.
- 3. Focus on familiarization Make familiarization your objective for the first week at your new job. Meet new people and figure out who's who. Learn the basics like where the bathrooms, meetings rooms, supplies and cafeteria are located. Learn the basics of what you are expected to be doing, who is on the team, what resources

are available and what your objectives are. Learn the basics about the company, people and project.

- 4. Establish your reputation Demonstrate good work habits, a positive attitude and dependability. Show up early, stay late and go the extra mile. Organize your work and plan out your tasks. Ask questions to help increase your understanding. Be flexible and adaptable because you may encounter changing tasks and priorities. Exhibit an inquisitive and strong work ethic.
- 5. Listen to learn Listen 80 percent and talk only 20 percent of the time. Listen to understand the problems that need to be solved. You can make stronger suggestions and present your ideas better after listening and understanding. Listen to the feedback you will get through quarterly reviews. If the process has only yearly performance reviews, ask for more frequent reviews your first year. If you do not understand, ask questions and really listen to the answers.
- 6. Communicate appropriately Make sure you use proper grammar and write coherently. If you need to use tools such as spell-check, do it. For important presentations or memos, ask someone to proofread or listen to your presentation before communicating the information. Practice important conversations with a friend or co-worker before having them at work. Think before speaking by pausing and quickly organizing the main two or three points in your mind before answering that question. Join professional organizations such as Toastmasters to help you improve your extemporaneous speaking and presentation skills.
- 7. Dress professionally Most engineering jobs do not require a

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suit and tie. However, even if the culture accepts jeans, don't wear them. Dress in slacks & button shirts; that is, business casual. Yes, you might stand out a bit but isn't that what you want?

- 8. Seek a mentor Seek out mentors both inside and outside the organization. Mentors inside the organization can steer you in the right direction. Mentors outside the organization can serve as sounding boards. When seeking a mentor, first identify what you want to learn. It's much easier to approach someone who excels in the skills you want to learn and ask that individual for advice.
- 9. Network Stay involved with your college friends, but also develop professional networks. Continue your membership in a professional organization (such as IEEE). Think about joining a GOLD group (Graduates Of the Last Decade) to share concerns, ideas and establish friendships. Most importantly, make sure you establish and keep an active network.
- 10. Have Fun You will be working for the next 30 to 40 years so enjoy the journey as you continue to learn and grow. Don't be discouraged if the position does not work out. Focus on the longterm objectives. Remember that your career will be a cross-country marathon, not a straight-as-an-arrow sprint.
